



Does and don't's

Rules to live by...



Make sure you ask questions at the start of the project



Ask questions if you have doubts – admins are there to help



Make sure you have sufficient time to do revisions – the project is not done before it is approved



Check and ensure no content is missing



Leave the project before approval from the admin



Miss the deadline
- inform admin in advance if you are having trouble



Argue with the admin



Only change colors and call it an option
